| Mentally handicapped | People with learning difficulties |
| The deaf | Deaf people/hard of hearing people (specify which <br> group) or hearing impaired people |
| The blind | Blind people/partially sighted people (specify which <br> group) or visually impaired people |
| Care | Personal help/personal support |
| Carers (only to be used when the individual <br> disabled person cannot make decisions for <br> her/himself) | Family members, relatives and friends <br> Carers (meaning paid home carers) |
| Special needs | Personal assistants |
| Disabled toilet | Specific requirements (state what these are) |
| Disabled parking | Accessible toilet |
| Wheelchair accessible | Wheelchair/scooter user or accessible to <br> wheelchair/scooter users |
| For wheelchairs | For wheelchair users |
| Wheelchair bound or confined to a wheelchair | Wheelchair user or person who uses a wheelchair |
